This project definitely had it's twists and turns, most noticeably that planting day on Saturday, October 27 was wet, wet, wet!

Fortunately, Sidney is a master Project Leader, having led [multiple CTree planting](#) in previous years.

He was able to get the word out to his volunteers that rain or shine, we would be planting trees that morning.

Sure enough, by 9:00am, there was a jubilant crowd of 30 volunteers excited to plant trees.

Cacapon Institute's Urban Watershed Forester, Tanner Haid, led a tree planting demonstration for all of the volunteers.

In addition to planting 24 evergreen trees in their common area along Kearneysville Pike, Deerfield Village also participated in Cacapon Institute's Your Community BMP program this season.

Through YourBMP, Cacapon Institute provides cost-share best management practices, like planting trees and native warm season grasses, to reduce stormwater runoff pollution



with private residents. This fall, 10 private homeowners at Deerfield Village planted a total of 27 trees and several patches of warm season grasses.

All-in-all, it was a very successful season at Deerfield Village HOA!

We look forward to continuing to work with this community and engaging their residents in tree plantings and other conservation projects!
